

Dear St. Matthew's family,

Hallelujah, Christ is risen. Christ is risen, indeed!

As we approach this sacred and joyful season of Easter, I am grateful for the incredible gift of love and salvation we have received through the resurrection of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Administrative Council Update from February

Please note that Administrative Council meetings are open to the congregation, even when we are holding them via Zoom during times of COVID precaution. If you wish to attend, please contact Chuck Hastings for Zoom details; however, be advised that discussion and voting are limited to Ad Council members. A list of the members of the 2024 Administrative Council can be found here.

Financial Status

Offerings were \$43.3k for January, which is \$5.4k under budget for the month. Total income was \$56.5k, which is \$12.5k under budget (including budgeted \$6.5k monthly withdrawals from investments). Total expenses for January were \$69.1k, which is \$0.1k over budget, including extraordinary expenditures of:

- \$1.7k for fire and elevator inspections,
- \$1.1k for Liberia scholarships,
- \$2.4k for snow and ice prep and removal,
- \$1.3k for quarterly Medicare supplement reimbursement, and
- \$1.5k to clear the UWF restricted account.

There was an operating loss of \$12.6k for January. The investment account ended the month with a balance of \$633.5k, down \$300, although no funds have yet been transferred from investments for the year.

Average weekly attendance in January was 142, down from the Christmas-month high of 190 in December. Copies of the January financial reports are available in the Narthex.

Communications Focus Group Initiatives

The Communications Focus Group provided updates on the priorities defined last year. Watch for notifications about updates to the Church

Directory. Check out our new Directory of Services to understand more about our church's many activities and services, and whom to



contact with questions or for more information. It is available on our website under "About Us"; hard copies are also available from the Church Office or at the Welcome Desk. Additionally, updates are in process to our church's website, with more to come!

2024 Budget Messaging

A small team is being formed to effectively communicate information about the approved 2024 budget and its projected shortfall. The team will also work to define a plan to overcome the current budget challenges and prevent future recurrences of the necessary investment withdrawals.

Records Management

An additional small team has been formed to review our many church records, including who generates them, where they are located, how they are stored, retention priorities and requirements (as mandated by the Book of Discipline and government entities), and the recommendation of a central electronic storage policy/method. Initial work by this team has resulted in the definition of the objectives, plan of approach, and resources needed. Look for more updates about this exciting work!

Are you a senior at Bowie High School or do you know one? Are you or is that senior already making a difference in the world, even while still in school?



Come to Calvary UMC* in Annapolis, at **3 p.m. on Sunday, March 10**, to hear a Festival of Hymns and




Organ Recital



Advent Reinvented



Many in the St. Matthew's congregation have been missing pre-Covid outreach projects such as Warm Nights, Sweatshirts for Students, and the Stocking Project for children of incarcerated parents. When we were invited to adopt a few families from the Warm Nights program, we joined this pilot program and adopted several homeless families. Their "wish lists" were distributed to various people in our congregation and to the St. Matthew's Early Education Center. We filled eight very large plastic bags with all the gifts and delivered them to the locations where the families were staying.

There was also a family who was going to transition to housing sometime in January and several people purchased housewarming gifts (e.g., ironing board, linens, dishes, utensils, pots and pans, cleaning supplies, bath supplies, etc.) for them to get started. This was an experiment and it went so well that we plan to assist additional families in the future.

Change Brings Hope: First Village Attends Creation Care Retreat

In Fall 2023, St. Matthew's provided \$3,000 to missionaries <u>Miguel Mairena</u> and <u>Nan McCurdy</u> (serving at <u>Give Ye Them to Eat</u> in Mexico) so they could host five villages at Creation Care Retreats in 2024. During the September 2023 Hunger Action Month, the children and youth's Change Brings Hope Penny War

raised \$1,109.82 (almost enough for two villages) and the Missions Committee contributed the remaining amount. Go to Change Brings Hope and Creation Care Retreats to learn more.

On December 19 and 20, GYTTE hosted the first of five retreats focused on stewardship of the environment.

Seventeen members of El Buen Pastor (Good Shepherd)

Church from Puebla City participated in the "Stewardship of Creation" workshop, as well as a "Dehydration of Fruits and Vegetables" workshop. They had a great experience at the Tree of Life Center, learning ways to care for the environment, and the children were very happy to be in the countryside.
