General Conference 2024

After affirming the hope of Easter – transformation into a new life in Jesus Christ, 862 voting delegates (half clergy and half lay, with 55.9% from the U.S., 32% from Africa, 6% from the Philippines, 4.6% from Europe and the remainder from concordat churches that have close ties to The United Methodist Church [UMC]) will gather in Charlotte, North Carolina, from April 23-May 3, 2024. The assembly was postponed three times since the pandemic. The delegates will work on 1,099 valid petitions, available in four official languages: English, French, Portuguese, and Kiswahili. As a reminder, Bishops preside at General Conference sessions but do not have a vote.

The theme of The General Conference 2024 is "...and know that I am God" (Psalm 46:9). Psalm 46 speaks to the UMC's tumultuous context as we gather to face the denomination's schism.

According to a Pew Research Center study, until recently, the United Methodist Church was the third largest Christian denomination in the U.S., dominating America's religious culture and landscape. More than 7,600 congregations have received permission to leave the denomination since 2019, according to the Lewis Center for Church Leadership, affiliated with Wesley Theological Seminary in Washington, D.C.

The critical issues at the General Conference 2024 are significant and reflect the challenges and opportunities facing The United Methodist Church amidst its current context. *Due to space constraints*, *each issue identified in the following paragraphs is further explained in the full article found here.*

The first issue will be the adoption of revised Social Principles. What are The Social Principles? The UMC has a long and rich history of concern for social justice. The Social Principles represent the Wesleyan spirit of social holiness and the prophetic spirit in an effort to respond to the call to discipleship of social engagement between faith

and practice.

The second issue will be the adoption of a proposed Regionalization Plan. The

Regionalization Plan seeks to restructure the UMC into four regional conferences with equal legislative power. This initiative aims to make the church more connectional, contextual, equitable, and just in its organization. There will be four regional conferences — Africa, Europe, the Philippines, and the U.S. — all possessing the same duties and powers to pass legislation for greater missional impact in their respective regions.

The third issue is the General Book of Discipline (BOD) legislation. The proposal for a revised General Book of Discipline addresses the need for a more inclusive and adaptable organizational framework. The Standing Committee on Central Conference Matters has been developing the BOD since 2012. The current BOD is an America-centered document, and central conferences need to adapt the Book of Discipline (Part VI) based on missional needs and differing legal contexts (BOD Paragraph 31). However, no such structure exists to deal with matters solely related to the United States.

Each of these issues reflects the UMC's efforts to navigate its internal dynamics while remaining faithful to its mission and values in a changing world. The decisions made at the General Conference 2024 will shape the future direction of the denomination and its ability to effectively engage with social, cultural, and theological challenges.

May God of unity inspire and uplift the hearts of United Methodists as they seek God's guidance and blessing for the General Conference.

Administrative Council Update from March

Financial Status

Offerings were \$53.7k, which is \$5.0k over budget for the month. YTD total income is \$123.4k, which is \$14.6k under budget. Total expenses for February were \$68.3k, which is \$0.7k under budget for the month. Apportionment is current. YTD total expense is \$137.4k, which is \$0.6k under budget.

There was an operating loss of \$1.4k for February, with a YTD operating loss of \$14.0k.

Investments increased by \$10.1k last month to

\$643.6k. For the year, the investment account balance is up \$10.1k. YTD there have been no transfers from investments.

The average weekly attendance last month was 143, which is up from 142 the previous month.

2024 Budget

Discussions continue within the Ad Council regarding the projected budget shortfall for 2024. While we continue to explore this important topic, there are no further developments to report. Fortunately, as reported above, we have not had to make any of the anticipated withdrawals from investments so far. We will keep you informed as we make progress on this topic.




