

# Administrative Council Update from March 2025

## Financial Status for February 2025

Offerings were \$61.8K, which is \$10.9K over budget for the month. YTD total income is \$142.9K, which is \$1.0K under budget. Total expenses for the month were \$66.5K, which is \$5.5K under budget for the month. Apportionment is current. YTD total expense is \$136.6K, which is \$7.4K under budget, excluding capital improvements.

There was an operating gain of \$2.2K for the month, with a YTD operating gain of \$6.3K (including grants and budgeted transfers from investments). Investments decreased by \$3.7K last month to \$629.5K. For the year, the investment account increased \$10.2K from \$619.3K. No funds have been transferred from the investment account so far this year.

The average weekly attendance last month was 143, which is up from 127 the previous month. Average weekly attendance last year was 137.

#### **Community Outreach Coordinator Position**

SPPRC presented an updated position description to the Administrative Council. SPPRC now plans to begin the hiring process.

#### **Trustees' Report**

The Trustees presented an update on the security system, some grant opportunities through the Bowie Supportive Housing Corporation, and a list of their priorities for 2025. You can read the complete Trustees' report <u>here</u>.







## **Christian Book Club**

## Liberia Church Roof Repair

In late December 2024, the roof of St. Matthew United Methodist Church in Logan Town, Liberia collapsed. Our church supports St. Matthew United Methodist School and Medical Clinic. The Liberian church raised \$1,050 and cleaned out the debris. Our church provided \$600 more, which allowed a contractor to make the church safe while they continue to raise the rest of the funds to complete the repairs. In early March, school principal Alphonso Sieh wrote that "the church was excited to receive the funds and sends thanks for your blessing."

# Christmas in April – Saturday, April 26

Christmas in April is a non-profit organization of volunteers in Prince George's County, Maryland. It began in 1989 to repair homes of low-income, elderly/disabled residents at no cost to them. It relies on community support and seeks funding from businesses, corporations, and individuals. Its success is due to the cooperative efforts of the county government, private businesses, civic and community organizations, churches, and synagogues.



The work can involve painting, spackling, plumbing, electrical, and carpentry. Also, volunteers clean up yards, trim and cut down trees and bushes, and

clean out cluttered homes. Smoke detectors, grab bars, and stair railings are installed, and windows and doors are repaired. This is a one-day event on the last Saturday of April every year.

There are many different jobs for volunteers. In addition to doing actual physical work, volunteers can be a House Captain, Area Coordinator, House Inspector, and/or serve on the Board.

St. Matthew's has supported this program since its beginning. I have been personally involved since 1991. Some years, St. Matthew's has provided House Captains. Other years, church volunteers have worked with other House Captains in the county.

**On Saturday, April 26, from 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m**, we expect Christmas in April to repair sixty homes, reaching a goal of over three thousand houses repaired since 1989—a monumental achievement! Our volunteers mean so much for the warmth, safety, and independence of these homeowners. To sign up, email or call me.

The communion offering in April will go to **Native American Ministries**. The offering is used to develop and strengthen Native American ministries in the annual conferences, and Native American rural, urban, and reservation ministries and communities. It also provides scholarships for Native Americans attending United Methodist schools of theology.

# Laity Invited to Attend AND Vote at Annual Conference

At the Baltimore-Washington Conference (BWC) Annual Conference, the number of clergy in attendance typically outweighs the laity attendees. To improve the ratio of clergy to laity, some congregants may attend the 2025 conference (May 13-15, Hilton Hotel at 401 West Pratt St., Baltimore) with prior District Superintendent approval, as follows:

- 1. They must have been a member of a BWC United Methodist Church for at least one year.
- 2. They must request advance approval to attend by sending an email to Dr. Johnsie Cogman at <a href="mailto:jcogman@bwcumc.org">jcogman@bwcumc.org</a>.
- 3. They must pay for all registration (\$149 early bird, \$159 regular, \$199 late), transportation, and accommodations.
- 4. They will have voting rights.



## St. Matthew's Finances at a Glance




## ST. MATTHEW'S FINANCE CHARTS (FEBRUARY 2025)




**Investment Account Balances & Drawdowns** 




#### Top 5 Mission Fund Donations Received Year-to-Date






#### Historical Annual Expenses, Income & Drawdowns
